

About the Real Cost Measure

Real Cost Measure = more accurate measure of who is struggling in California

Real Cost Measure incorporates the cost of housing, food, health care, child care, & other basic needs

Focus is on working households

State, regional, county, and neighborhood-level data

Nearly 1,600 household budgets by household size for every CA county



Population Focus	Households
Housing	Fair Market Rent Rates Dept. of Housing and Urban Development
Food	Low Cost Food Plan Dept. of Housing and Urban Development
Child care	CA Department of Education
Health care	Consumer Expenditure Survey
Transportation	Consumer Expenditure Survey
Miscellaneous	10% of Basic Needs
Taxes	Federal/State Taxes/Payroll Taxes & Child Care and Child Tax Credits

Income Gap after Wages and Public Assistance for Average Household *below* the Real Cost Measure





Riverside County




Nearly 1 in 3 households in California (33%) fall below the Real Cost Measure



Real Cost Measure by Neighborhood Clusters



Percent of Households below Real Cost Measure




Percent below Real Cost Measure by Ethnicity


Estimated Households below Real Cost Measure by Ethnicity

Educational Attainment and Real Cost Measure











Percent of Households Paying at Least 30% of Income on Housing




Median Household Income by Neighborhood Clusters


Median Household Income in Inland Region



CA GDP and Median Household Earnings







Policies and Programs

- ✓ AB 1515 (Santiago) Cal EITC Outreach and Education Program, Free Tax Prep
- ✓ SB 860 (Rubio) Young Child Tax Credit removes earning requirement and adjusts for inflation
- ✓ SB 843 (Glazer) Renter Tax Credit Refundable credit increased to adjust for inflation (to \$1,000 for joint filers/those with dependents).
